



Much has taken place at St. Peter's since its 60th Anniversary celebration under the leadership of Rev. Lars B. Staaby who was the pastor at that time. St. Peter's was then a member of the Twin Valley Lutheran Parish along with St. John's, R.D. Ashland. In October, 1967, St. Peter's and St. John's, along with St. Paul's, Gordon, Zion's, Girardville and Good Shepherd, Ashland voted to merge and formed what became known as the Ashland Area Lutheran Parish. Pastor Staaby left us in 1967 and Rev. Robert Hughes along with help from Rev. Lawrence Hand and Rev. Donald Henderschedt, who was an intern at that time, became our pastors and guides until we became Christ's United in 1969. Rev. Robert Hughes continued on as full time pastor and newly ordained Rev. Donald Henderschedt joined him in 1969. An impressive list of pastors and interns have joined in the leadership of St. Peter's Chapel since that time. In 1977, Good Shepherd withdrew from the merger and the remaining four chapels reorganized and retained the original name of Christ's United. A bright future looms under the leadership of the present pastors, who have the unique position of being a husband and wife team. We are sure that under their leadership we will continue to prosper and gain in both strength and faith in the future.

In attempting to summarize the events that have taken place over the last 15 years, along with the additions, renovations, gifts, etc., the committee felt that it would be almost impossible to name all the donors of gifts, participants in events, etc., without inadvertently omitting someone. Therefore, the following information will contain no names, but we know that all of the congregation of St. Peter's are forever grateful to all who gave or participated in our growth over

the years.

In 1967, a bulletin board was purchased for the outside of the church and the doors and windows of the church basement were replaced and/or repaired along with the installation of the fire door. In March, 1970, gowns were purchased for the organist, choir and acolytes. Renovations were also done in the Primary Rooms in April and May of 1970. In October, 1971, carpeting was placed in the hallway and the stairs and in March, 1972, a new dossal was placed behind the altar. In April, 1973, new tile was installed on the floor of the kitchen and in July, 1973, new pews were purchased from Endicott Church Furniture Company. Some of these pews were given in memory or in honor of loved ones. New carpeting was also purchased for the sanctuary in September, 1973. During these years, Chrismons were made and placed on the Christmas tree and made the season rather special when they were explained and dedicated prior to Christmas Day Services.

On August 24, 1975 at 3:30 A.M., the community was awakened to the wail of fire sirens and members of St. Peter's were saddened by the fact that the fire was at the church. The fire, which was caused by vandals, did extensive damage to the church and along with the financial loss of approximately \$15,600, which was fortunately covered by insurance, a lot of precious memories were destroyed. Once again a challenge was faced by the congregation and without interruption of services and church functions, the extensive repairs were done within the next few months and by Christmas, 1975, the church had been to almost normal. In 1976 new draperies and curtains were acquired to replace those lost in the fire. Additional hymnals were purchased for the primary room and new organist, choir and acolyte gowns were acquired to replace those lost in the fire. Additional hymnals were also purchased. New furniture was purchased for the primary room and repairs were done to the stained glass windows of the sanctuary. New siding was placed on the church and a new cross was placed on the steeple. Over a period of the last few years, new hymnals, a Paschal Stand and Candle, a Sanctuary Lamp, a Processional Cross, a Ceramic Nativity Set and a new Altar Book were purchased in memory or in honor of loved ones by members and friends of St. Peter's. In 1977, the parking lot was paved and renovation of the picnic grove began in 1979. Railings were also placed in front of the church and the lawn was reseeded in 1979. The latest addition to the physical property of the church was cushioning of the choir pews.

At the present time there are 153 active confirmed members at St. Peter's. As was stated in the beginning of this history, many things have happened in the last 15 years, indeed, in the last 75 years many deaths, births, weddings, new members, losses of old members by transfers receiving of new members by transfers, etc., but the church remains steadfast and with the help of God will do so for

many years to come.
