

# **Pastor Kim's Message**

Recent events has called up the question: what is the role of the pastor?

A survey was taken this weekend which indicated that 86.7% of Christ's United worshipping congregation (131 that week) support and affirm Pastor Kim's ministry at the beginning of worship. But even with that level of affirmation, the question of the pastor's role yet remains unresolved.

The Lutheran identity of pastors is born in scripture, both the Old and New Testaments. It is an identity and responsibility given to Moses, in leading the people out of slavery, through the wilderness and into the promise of God. Moses, a foreigner himself in the land of Egypt, had the trappings of earthly authority as a member of the Pharaoh's household. Yet it was the call of God which caused him to be a leader of the people. As there seem to be very few burning bushes these days, Joshua may be a better example of "call":

Moses spoke to the Lord, saying, "Let the Lord, the God of the spirits of all flesh, appoint someone over the congregation who shall go out before them and come in before them, who shall lead them out and bring them in, so that the congregation of the Lord may not be like sheep without a shepherd." So the Lord said to Moses, "Take Joshua son of Nun, a man in whom is the spirit, and lay your hand upon him; have him stand before Eleazar the priest and all the congregation, and commission him in their sight.

Numbers 27.15-19.

Lutherans' understanding of "call" changes the relationship between pastors and congregations. Discernment and recognition of a call from God to pastoral ministry occurs during the seminary process, and issuance of a call from a congregation serves as affirmation of God's call to the individual. Different from an employer/employee relationship, the relationship between the pastor and the congregation is formalized in a Letter of Call, which is a written recognition of the pastor as one called by God to serve that community of faith.



As congregation's needs and ministries are different, so are the terms of each Letter of Call. However the basic identity of a pastor is the same:

> When they finished eating, Jesus asked Simon Peter, "Simon son of John, do you love me more than these?" Simon replied, "Yes, Lord, you know I love you."

Jesus said to him, "Feed my lambs."

Jesus asked a second time, "Simon son of John, do you love me?" Simon replied, "Yes, Lord, you know I love you." Jesus said to him, "Take care of my sheep."

John 21.15-16

In John the image of shepherd provides an understanding of both pastoral identity and role as we follow both Jesus' identity as the Good Shepherd and Jesus' instruction to Peter. But like burning bushes and Moses, shepherds are not a group we relate to on a regular basis (if at all!). So what are some qualities of shepherds we do know?

Shepherds feed the sheep (John 21.15). As shepherds lead the sheep to green pastures to nourish their bodies, so are pastors to speak the Word so that the people may be fed with the bread of life, Jesus Christ. Similarly, as the shepherds needed to constantly seek green pastures for the sheep, pastor need to seek ever deeper and broader ways to connect communities with Christ.

Shepherds are to care for the sheep (John 21.16). The first thought is that as shepherds tend to the poor and lame so are pastor to care for the poor, sick, and grieving to the people. But remember that shepherds have a much greater responsibility than that: sheep were at constant danger both from wolves and also thieves. Pastors need to be wary by being rooted in the Word.

The American Red Cross remains in the midst of a severe blood shortage and has issued an emergency call for blood and platelet donations. Ice, snow, and subfreezing temperatures in many states have led to blood drive cancellations.

Shepherds are to seek out the lost sheep (Matthew 18.12). The first priority of the shepherd is not the sheep who are gathered safely together, but those who are in danger because of their separation from the flock. In congregations, this means that the pastor must always be involved in the community and outreach, actively looking for those who are not in the fold of Christ.

**Shepherds are to lead the sheep (Numbers 27.12-20).** Perhaps the hardest to image or to practice, the shepherd is responsible for leading the sheep from one place to another. If the sheep were to stay in one location, no matter how comfortable it may be at the time, they would soon overcome the available food supply and die of starvation (unless supplements were shipped in). Pastors are to lead the people from where they have gathered to where God leads them.

Our modern world has consistently changed how pastors do each of these elements of call, but not the essence of them. What do you think? Or more importantly, what do you believe?



WELCA will begin making Easter candy soon. Watch the bulletin for exact dates. Help is needed!






## KNAUGHTY KNOTTERS





## 'From great to good'

Jim Collins' 2001 book Good to Great featured companies that had "made the leap" to greatness. Years later, many of them are no longer great; some aren't even around.

Should Christians seek greatness? After all, our attempts to be great — wealthy, powerful, successful, famous — often become the "enemies" of our doing the good God commands.

God's Word flips on its head the saying "good is the enemy of great." The meek, Jesus teaches, will inherit the earth (Matthew 5:5). "Whoever would be great among you," he says, "must be your servant" (Mark 10:43, ESV). One of Jesus' most famous parables is called the Good Samaritan, not the Great Samaritan, And goodness, not greatness, is a fruit of the Spirit.

Christians and churches are called not to greatness but to doing good for the sake of the world. Let's shift our focus "from great to good."
